Aim of the King Lear Prizes: To get as many people in Britain involved in an active creative arts project during their period of isolation, starting with the over 70s

Challenges Faced by Over 70s during COVID-19

Known Benefits of the Arts for Older People

King Lear Prizes provide an opportunity



- Increased loneliness, due to not being able to have visits from family and friends
- Disruption of routine and lack of things to do: due to not being able to go out to classes, activities or visits
- Increased anxiety due to worries about COVID-19



- Older people state that creative and cultural participation is a significant contributor to their overall wellbeing
- Participation in arts known to increase confidence and self-esteem
- Improve or preserve cognitive functions



- Gets older people involved in a creative arts activity
- Gives them a project to stuck in to during lockdown
- Opportunity to share progress and connect with friends and family

Progress so far: A huge response, but now we need to run a professional judging process, then celebrate the winners



16,000 entries from around 8,000 people, mostly over 70 with some over 60s from March to the deadline on 19 June



Excellent quality of entries in all categories: music, art, drama, poetry, short story



Team of well-known creatives secured as judges for shortlisted entries, including Gyles Brandreth, Julian Lloyd Webber, Steven Knight (Peaky Blinders)



Potential for performances, exhibitions and publications of the winning works

Progress so far: Most importantly, a great response from our entrants

"As me and my husband are in the at risk category, both over 70 with health problems, I found I had a lot of time on my hands.

I decided to write a story for the competition. With the beautiful weather I sat in the garden with my note book and began writing."

"It's been a marvellous idea all round. It has given a lot of us oldies the motivation to get down to using our skills which may be a bit rusty. Motivation is very important to us when we get older. Thank you to all of you"

"I thought you might like to know that the prizes have proved to be hugely motivational for me. As someone with a disability who also experienced a horrible episode of COVID-19 in March, writing pieces for the awards has given me a motivational focus, and helped discover a new kind of writing I have never done before. It has helped me emerge from a trough of despond, and a very difficult time of severe health problems. My big challenge is what to do next, once the awards are over!"

"Art has saved me during lockdown. I am not a professional artist but being able to submit something in the over 60 category has kept me sane."

Petra

"I am a 76 year old Indian woman. I came to Britain to study at age 18, met a Scottish student and married him. He passed away sadly two years ago but he has left me two lovely children and five grandchildren...On 19th March I had an MRI Scan and was given the results by my Cardiologist over the phone telling me that I was suffering from heart failure...I became completely inert and felt much worse, wondering when the end will take place. Your King Lear Competition gave me a new start and I have got up and painted and written, poetry, the short story and poems. I am less depressed and more hopeful. I know that even though the lockdown may be easing but my quarantine has some time to run."

"I felt unsettled by all that was happening around me and felt quite lethargic yet anxious. Then I read about The King Lear competition. Something to work towards! A purpose. My huge canvas (thank heavens I don't have to post it) has been unwrapped and I am loving every minute of creating my painting for the Chairman's prize."

"I retired from teaching 2010 and bought loads of art materials to start and paint but somehow never got around to it. My wife actually bought me a large shed but still not used it until your competition. It's not about winning it's about painting again.

- Up to 4 minutes
- Able to be performed by one person
- Any instrument
- Submit manuscript or audio recording

Poetry



- Up to 40 lines
- In English
- Any form or subject
- Submit full text

Prize: £1,000

Short Story



- Up to 10,000 words
- In English
- Any subject or setting
- Submit full text

Prize: £1,000

Short Drama



- Up to 15 minutes in running time
- Performed by up to 4 people
 - In English
- Any subject or setting
- Submit full script

Prize: £1,000

WHAT? Selecting the winners

WHO? Small panels of 1-4 eminent arts judges

HOW? Scheduled video conference after time to assess shortlisted entries individually

Our Ask of You

- You have some relevant experience
 (e.g. student of literature, music, art;
 experience as a teacher, creative or in
 the relevant industry)
- Volunteering your time, free of charge
- A commitment to fair and unbiased judging
- At least 2 hours per week (or equivalent e.g. longer sessions less often)

We use simple criteria to score the works, and we ensure all works are judged by more than one person to ensure fair scoring

What happens next?

- Let us know you're interested, let us know your experience and which category you'd like to help to judge (art, music, drama, short story, poetry)
- Organise a welcome call, with one of the team who will explain the role of a Judging Associate, how to use the online system, and answer any questions you may have
- **Do a trial run.** Take 15-20 entries, and just try out scoring them, then let us know how it's going. Our team will be available to help you with any questions you have!
- **Get going!** Get through as many entries as you can, while becoming quicker and more experienced as a judge
